

A Note from Pastor Joanne – "Hunger, hungering, hungry and heart?"

The world is hungry for food, shelter, love, and healing. How can a little bit of food feed thousands of people? What else is the world hungry for? This passage invites humanity to imagine how Jesus can meet the needs of the world and have extra left over. It encourages us to believe that small sacrifices can yield large outcomes.

Having a heart to give all that you have for the sake of others is powerful. That's a part that could be missed in this passage of Scripture. The demand was high. Time was tight. The crowds were growing. The unmet needs were greater than the resources that were seen at the surface. The disciples worried about the limited amount of food and how it could reach a growing crowd. Jesus called the believers to trust that their physical and spiritual needs would be fulfilled beyond their greatest expectations. What happens when our hearts are transformed? We move from believing that we can only help a few to embracing five thousand. What must we do to embrace our miracles?

Questions: How much will it cost to feed all these people? Is proof needed to determine that people need our help? Is it our job to make room here for people who have great needs? Trusting God for big things is huge! What test is this from Jesus? How are you feeling God's presence? The questions are unlimited, but our answers need to indicate our willingness to follow Jesus. Feeding people and meeting unmet needs continues to impact our faith journeys.

Consider these: How creative are you in feeding your community? Is your congregation a place of peace and security for the community? Are the crowds still seeking healing and food? How are healing prayers shared in your congregation? How is God calling you to believe in miracles?

In the middle of September we will begin to collect for the holidays – Thanksgiving and Christmas. Look for the list in the Messenger and bulletin soon so that we can show Jesus' love and grace to our neighbors in need. How creative are you in feeding our community? Can we be a place a peace and security in the community? Do we need to know how much it costs to feed people in need? Jesus offered a little and fed many. What can we do as a small congregation to help fill the need? There are many people who are in need. So can we help them meet their immediate, short-term needs. Let us help them have a great time and wonderful family holiday meals. Let's start today.

The 2019 synod assembly will take place Friday and Saturday, June 7 and 8, at the Tinley Park Convention Center, 18451 Convention Center Dr., Tinley Park, IL 60477.

The 2018 synod assembly took place on June 8 and 9, 2018, at the Tinley Park Convention Center, 18451 Convention Center Dr., Tinley Park, IL 60477.

Report on the 31st Annual Assembly-Metropolitan Chicago Synod, ELCA

The Metropolitan Chicago Synod met in assembly June 8 to 9, 2018, at the Tinley Park Convention Center, Tinley Park, Illinois. This year's theme was A New Heaven and a New Earth from Revelation 21:1. After devotions and the Order for the Opening of an Assembly, the parliamentarian was appointed, the agenda approved, and committees appointed. Instructions were given on nominations and resolutions. The assembly then heard from Mr. Paul Miles, President and CEO of the We Raise Foundation, whose vision is "People free from poverty, violence, and inequality." The synod them continued its ongoing discussion about racism and diversity with a keynote presentation from motivational speaker Mr. Darrell Gordon.

After conducting conference meetings held over lunch, the assembly heard from partner ministries including Portico Benefit Services, Mission Investment Fund, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois, the ELCA Credit Union, ELCA World Hunger, and synod treasurer Ms. Yvette NewberryWhite gave her report. The assembly then attended one of two sessions of workshops and hearings before reconvening in the plenary session to hear the churchwide office report from the Rev. Wm Chris Boerger, ELCA Secretary, and to vote for voting members to the 2019 Churchwide Assembly, and to debate resolutions. A Celebration of the Holy Eucharist to which all were invited concluded the day's events. The offering of \$1,925.46 will be used for the synod leaders fund.

Throughout the plenary sessions, participants heard eight mission moments, coordinated by the synod's Mission Interpreter Network, telling the story of congregations and partner ministries making a difference in their local communities, nationally, and around the world.

After devotions on Saturday morning, the budget was adopted, rostered leaders new to the synod were welcomed, rostered leader and congregation anniversaries were acknowledged, and the synod also honored congregations that have either closed or who have made the decision to close.

Come Alive Ministries was welcomed as an official congregation of the synod. The Rev. Marrion Johnson, the congregation's pastor, and members of the congregation were available to take part in the welcome.

Mr. Terry Henderson, synod vice president, gave his report and presented the synod's lay leadership award, the Sunergos Award, posthumously to Mr. Steve Homberg, the synod's business manager who died in March. The Rev. Erin Clausen, synod secretary, then gave her report before a final session of debate on resolutions

The day ended with a closing prayer and the Order for the Closing of an Assembly.
