Finding life's calling NH-S' Vlahovic joins MLB stars in helping vets

New Hope-Solebury baseball coach Tony Vlahovic's background prepared him well for his life's calling. A lefty standout pitcher out of Whitehall High School, Vlahovic still ranks third on Wilkes University's all-time saves list. After college, he pitched in Italy and earned his team's Rookie of the Year. When he came back to the

When he came back to the States, Vlahovic signed with the Red Sox and earned a spot on their 40-man roster

40-man roster. Prior to taking the job at New Hope-Solebury, Vlahovic won a state title as an assistant coach at

state title as an assistant coach at Princeton Day School. Vlahovic's background prepared him well for his life's calling. Except that Vlahovic will tell you that his life's calling has little to do with baseball.

"My parents were real influential about giving back and helping oth-ers. I didn't really know what that meant until I went through some pretty tough life experiences and came out through the other end,"

Vlahovic said. Think of adversity as a nasty left-handed hitter. Think of Vlahovic as the lefty specialist

Vlahovic as the lefty specialist called in to pitch to adversity. Vlahovic survived cancer as a teenager. If that weren't enough of a medical malady, Vlahovic was hit by a drunk driver heading to Spring Training; his left leg and baseball career were instantly destroyed. It took him 18 months to fully physi-cully recover.

took him 18 months to fully physi-cally recover. "It took some work on myself. I was definitely depressed after the accident, the rehab and going back to graduate school. I felt like a fish out of water," he admitted. "It was a struggle. But I think the idea of 'I could, still make a difference 1 could still make a difference. I could still do something that means something in this world' pushed me on. It was definitely a process. It did not happen over night." Life threw Tony Vlahovic two vicious curveballs before he was

He works as a strength trainer and a counselor at the wellness center he runs in Hopewell Township. "When I was going through the rehab process, I didn't feel like I was just part of the system and I wanted to change that. A big part of (healing), besides the physical part of it, is mentally." he noted. "How to be more positive, think about how you want to progress and have some goals in your life that you some goals in your life that you want to obtain.

some goals in your life that you want to obtain. "The way you do that is to look at your life, look at what you can do as a person. Also, real importantly, is giving back and doing something for other people. That's how I was able to go as far as I did. Someone stepped back and helped me. I never forgot that." On June 17, Vlahovic joined for-mer Major League all-stars such as Dmitri Young, Steve Rogers and Bob Boone to give back at the Hope4Heroes Charity Baseball Game in Lakewood, N.J. has qualified for the largest ama-teur motocross race in the world, the 30th annual AMA Amateur National Motocross Championships at Loretta Lynn's National Ranch.

Bader took on more than 20,000 hopefuls from across America to earn one of just 1,386 qualifying positions. "The Amateur Nationals at

"The Amateur Nationals at Loretta Lynn's is the event every motocross racer in the country wants to compete in," event direc-tor Tim Cotter said. "A win at the Amateur Nationals gives a rider instant national notoriety and can serve as a springboard to a lucra-tive professional motocross career."

Most of America's top profes-sional motocrossers, including James Stewart, Ricky Carmichael, Travis Pastrana and Jeremy

McGrath, have won AMA Amateur McGrath, have won AMA Amateur National Championships at Loretta Lynn's. The race is so prestigious that in years past, teenage stars Dean Wilson, from California, and Eli Tomac, from Colorado, were awarded premier professional contracts.

tracts. Bader, who attends Richland Elementary, has been riding since he was 5 years old. With the help of sponsors such as Barefoot Racing, Vortex and EVS, Bader has had the emerchanity to purgue his dramme opportunity to pursue his dreams. He has won many races in the last two years and competes nearly every weekend at several local tracks.

I told him, 'My thoughts are with you. I know you're putting your life on the line and any way I can bring awareness or bring people to help you guys, I would do that.' It definitely had special meaning to me."

For the record, Vlahovic played outfield and first base due to a glut of Legends pitchers. The Heroes rallied from a 4-0 deficit to win 5-4 in the bottom of the seventh, and last inning.

last inning. "Bob Boone and I were standing in the dugout against the fence and people were asking for autographs going back and forth.
