On July 20, the 45th anniversary of the Special Olympics organiza-tion, another milestone in Special

Olympics history was reached. The first official Special Olympics baseball game was

played in Montgomery, N.J., between North Jersey and Central Jersey. The teams were made up of New Jersey and Pennsylvania Special Olympic athletes. It was the first game in a series of three. Prior to the three games, softball had

The idea of Special Olympics adding baseball as a sport began in February and was the brainchild of Jeff Baldino, senior director of competition; Ryan Ceresani, unified sports manager and Naw Hones. sports manager; and New Hope-Solebury High baseball manager Tony Vlahovic. Initially, indoor clinics, open to all area Special Olympic athletes, were conducted for three months, teaching the athletes basic baseball skills.

The New Hope-Solebury base-ball players were part of the initial phase, instructing and having fun teaching the athletes the game of

baseball. (This was part of the community service expected of the players in the New Hope-Solebury baseball program.) After the indoor clinics, the second phase was work-ing with the athletes on a regulation baseball field. The

general consensus of the athletes was the bases were too far apart. At the end of the two-month phase, two teams were selected and

the games began.
